Our Mission

To facilitate individual and collective action to transform the systems of inequity that create hunger and cause it to persist.

Impact

A world of equity, interconnectedness and collaboration — a world where hunger is completely unacceptable.

Long-term Outcomes

Effective leadership action by individuals, especially women and youth, who step forward as community leaders to ensure every person has the opportunity to lead a healthy, productive, resilient and self-reliant life in harmony with nature.

Sufficient government and funder commitment to recognize and take the required actions, shifts in priority, and devolution of power and resources necessary to end hunger, in harmony with the natural environment.

Collective voice of individuals living in hunger and poverty to demand change of their central governments through associational strength within and among communities.

Access to resources, autonomy & opportunity. An enabling environment of equity, peace and stewardship of the natural environment, where communities access the training, information or resources needed to ensure lives free from hunger, unencumbered by entrenched social barriers.

A self-reliant mindset amongst communities.

Women, youth and other groups subject to marginalisation have access to resources, assets and services.

New partnerships between communities, the government and the private sector that uphold access to basic human rights.

Context

Weak Governance

Authorities display limited accountability, leadership, integrity, stewardship, and transparency.

Low Levels of Community Engagement

Citizens are unaware of their rights, have low confidence that they can influence decision-making and do not organise themselves to create change.

Inequity

The rights of women, and other groups subject to marginalisation, are not respected, resulting in their exclusion from influence and resources.

Food Security

Hunger is worsening and the smallholder women farmers at the heart of food security, accessibility, utilisation and stability are not being included in food systems and dialogues.

Conflict

Conflict, political instability and displacement are direct drivers of inequity, hunger and food insecurity.

Climate Crisis

Environmental shocks, including extreme weather events, are hitting those least equipped to mitigate, adapt and recover presenting an added vulnerability.
